Open Session

The meeting was called to order at 7:12 p.m. via video conference by Chair Janet Pauli.

Public Expression

Chair Pauli explained that anything not currently on the agenda may be discussed at this time, however no action could be taken. She further advised that comments would be welcome throughout the meeting.

Vice-Chair Brown discussed the importance of completing the 2020 Census and that the deadline has been extended to October. Large amounts of funding for our County depend on these numbers.

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Minutes

On a motion by Vice-Chair Brown, seconded by Reardan, the minutes of the meeting of June 11, 2020 were unanimously approved with the following change: page 2, section g: at the end of the paragraph add the words 'URRWM meeting'.

Consent Calendar

On a motion by Vice-Chair Brown, seconded by Reardan, the consent calendar items for June 2020 were unanimously approved.

Commissioner Reports

- a. Report from the Upper Russian River Stewardship Alliance regarding frost water use—No report.
- b. <u>Eel/Russian River Commission meeting update</u>—No report.
- c. <u>North Coast Quagga/Zebra Mussel Prevention Consortium update</u>—Vice-Chair Brown reported that the prevention program is currently functioning at both Lake Sonoma and Mendocino.
- d. Update regarding actions and discussion of the state water bond issues—No report.
- e. <u>Report on the Upper Russian River Water Agency JPA</u>—It was reported that the City of Ukiah and Sanitation District have indicated their interest in joining the JPA.
- f. <u>Report on Upper Russian River Water Manager's meeting</u>—The next meeting is scheduled for August 12.
- g. <u>Discussion of ground water rights & Sustainable Groundwater Mgmt Act (SGMA)</u>—Vice-Chair Brown reported that the next meeting will be in August, on the second Thursday at 1:30 pm.
- h. <u>City of Ukiah purple pipe recycled water program</u>—It was reported that all treated water from the WWTP is being used for irrigation by the contracted purple pipe customers.
- j. <u>CalCannabis regulation and related issues</u>—Vice-Chair Brown reported that she is getting many calls regarding illegal grows and resultant degradation of the environment.

Potter Valley Project

a. <u>Status report and discussion of the Two-Basin Partnership efforts to license the Potter Valley Project</u>— Pauli reported that the Feasibility Study report was filed on time and there were hundreds of comments that were submitted to FERC during the comment period. Many of the letters in favor of taking down Scott Dam were form letters. There were a large number of

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commenters in support of relicensing the PVP. FERC is reviewing the comments at this time. Several of the comments from the Forest Service, County of Lake, CA Dept of Fish and Wildlife and other agencies were in regards to the studies that they believe need to be performed and what they should consist of. By mid-September, the Planning Partners need to have a report on the PG&E's studies that were originally required and how much of that work was done as some were only partially completed. Those studies were estimated to cost \$11 million. An extension of deadlines may be required as more time will be needed to collect data for the studies. The proposed Project Plan outlined in the FS report is not final as there are many uncertainties that are still in play, such as the large amount of sediment behind Scott Dam and how it would affect the Eel River if released. The impacts of these issues still need to be studied.

Vice-Chair Brown reported that she has received a notice from PG&E that they are announcing conservation easements and sale of property in the nearby area of Potter Valley. This could include the Lake Pillsbury watershed, campgrounds and other important parcels of land.

- b. <u>Update on current Lake Pillsbury releases to the Eel & Russian rivers</u>—Pauli reported that there is a variance on the FERC license due to the current drought and the low inflows into Lake Pillsbury. This occurred in 2014,15,16, and 2018 due to low inflow into Lake Pillsbury. All of the Storage Target Curves are being met and it looks like all of the water user needs will be met.
- c. Sam Sandoval Study—No report.

Update on the IWPC Communication Program

a. <u>Website</u>—Jones reported that they are continuing to work on the video production regarding the PVP and are hoping to have them ready by mid-August. They are also working on a virtual version of the tours of the Eel River watershed and PVP that are normally offered in the spring.

U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Feasibility Study on Coyote Dam

- a. Report on Lake Mendocino water levels and conditions at Coyote Valley Dam—No report.
- b. <u>Discussion of Feasibility Study (FS)</u>—The funds left over at the Corps for the FS have been sent back to IWPC and deposited. The Corps has transferred their Savings Bank of Mendocino County funds to the IWPC bank account.
- c. <u>Discussion of grant funding for the FS</u>—No report.
- d. <u>Progress on Huffman's Forecast Informed Reservoir Operations bill</u>—Approximately 11,000 AF was saved in Lake Mendocino because of FIRO. The late May rainfall was completely captured in the lake which would have gone down the Russian River under the old operation method.
