December 17, 2024

Open Session

The meeting was called to order at 3:05 p.m. in the County Ag conference room by Chair Janet Pauli.

OPEN SESSION

Minutes

Motion by Schoeneman, seconded by Koball, to approve the November 11, 2024 minutes was unanimously approved.

Consent Calendar

Motion by Rodin, seconded by Koball, the consent calendar items for November 2024 were unanimously approved.

Commissioner Reports

• Schoeneman reported that as of January, the water bills will be coming from the City of Ukiah for all of the consolidated water districts.

Potter Valley Project

- a. Status report and discussion on the Potter Valley Project—Pauli reported that they are working with our partners on preparing a non-binding MOU to be completed by January before PG&E releases their draft license surrender plans to the public. The public will have 30 days to comment. PG&E will then consider the comments and prepare their final plan to FERC for the July deadline. Once PG&E's final license surrender document is approved, we will be working on a binding agreement with our partners regarding diversion rates, which will describe all the conditions under which water will be diverted.
- b. <u>Eel-Russian Project Authority JPA update</u>—No future meetings are scheduled until more progress with the PG&E negotiations is made.
- c. <u>Continued discussion of funding ongoing PVP negotiations between MCIWPC, FERC and PG&E</u>—Pauli relayed that in January there will be a discussion on IWPC's funding options and what the possibilities are for funding the various projects and programs.
- **d.** <u>Discussion of objectives for marketing and public education program</u>—Pauli reported that KP is working on an informational video with the goal to have it on our website. It will be available for all agencies to use. In addition, the Jacobs Group PowerPoint slides for the workshop in Potter Valley by the Jacobs Groups has been matched with an audio description of the slides and should be available shortly.

U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Feasibility Study (FS) on Coyote Valley Dam (CVD)

- a. Nagy reported that there were three questions he had regarding the potential for a Feasibility Study with the Corps of Engineers. 1. What schedule could the Corps accept for execution of the Cost Share Agreement; 2. Ramifications of including a second non-federal sponsor; 3. Near term financial implications of executing the Agreement.
 - 1. Because of the timing of negotiations with PG&E, IWPC is asking for approval to delay the signing of a Cost Share Agreement with the Corps. The Corps agreed to the end of March 2025 versus the end of December 2024.

- 2. IWPC is considering including the Lytton Tribe as a second non-Federal sponsor which would include a monetary credit under Federal statue that would be applied to the FS non-Federal sponsor matching funds, at a \$658,000 maximum. The committee has met with the Tribe and are working out terms. Lytton has expressed their interest in joining into an agreement with IWPC delineating what each parties' responsibilities would be.
- 3. The Corps may require proof that IWPC could continue with their portion of the cost share after the first year. Nagy believes that the second year may require around \$750,000 in matching funds if the Commissioners decide to move forward.

The Corps has been very helpful and cooperative. Nagy is recommending that the Commissioners approve authority to the Commission Chair and consultant to move forward negotiating with the Corps and in signing the Cost Share Agreement. Motion by Rodin, seconded by McGourty authorizing the consultants and Janet to move forward to negotiate and execute the Cost Share agreement, was unanimously approved.
